A FAMILY FROM THE CRIMEA

Betty Heidt

My maternal great-grandfather, Frank Kubischta, was born in Vienna, Austria in 1815. He grew to manhood in Vienna and learned the trade of shoe repair. Frank's wife was a woman from Salzburg, Austria. Their family consisted of 1 girl and 5 boys.

At this time in history, the Russians had won a war with Turkey and took into their possession the peninsula of Crimea, in the Black Sea. They killed or chased all the Turks out of the area and needed new settlers. Because Russia had helped Austria fight a war with Germany, Austria had promised to send one male settler for every Russian soldier that was killed in the war.

Frank Kubischta's large family was hard to provide for, so he gathered up his children (Frank, Joseph, Carl. John, Anton, and Anna) and started for the Crimea. Not only did Frank's family move, but the families of John Dolecheck, Joseph Novotny, Anton Roller, Joseph Fidler, Frank Praus, John Huschka, and Wenzel Drimel went along to form a wagon train. Their wagon train took 2 months to reach the town of Kirey-Tabor in Eastern Crimea. They got there too late in 1859 for the crop, so the Russian government gave them 300 rubles to provide for their families.

There was not much there when they arrived. Each male received 80 acres (32 dessiatine) on which to farm and ranch and build their houses. They built their houses in one village. They constructed them out of sand rock which could be cut with a special saw. These replaced the dirt huts in which the Turks had lived.

In addition to his farming and sheep ranching, he also had a shoe repair shop. Frank Kubischta, died at Dickinson, North Dakota, July 6, 1906.

In 1887, Frank's son, Joseph F. Kubischta married Marie Semerad, daughter of John and Dorothea (Sharepa) Semerad. Out of this marriage were born, Anton 1888, Anna 1891, Marie 1894, Joseph 1896, Alois and Philomenia (twins) 1900, Katerina 1903, Frances 1905, Frank 1907, (died in 1920) James 1911.

In September, 1899, the family of John F. Kubischta, moved to the United States of America. On October 4, 1899, they reached Dickinson, North Dakota and spent the winter with John's brother-in-law, Joseph Semerad. In the spring of 1900, John moved to a homestead south of Dickinson, where he farmed until he retired in 1916. John F. Kubischta, died in November 1929, and his wife, Marie (Semerad) Kubischta died July 1937.

On November 19, 1909, John's son Anton married Philomenia Dolecheck, then moved to a homestead south of South Heart, North Dakota. To this family were born 7 boys and 2 girls. Valentine 1910, Vincent 1911, Anton 1913, Florian 1915, John 1916, Emilia 1919, Vendeline (Ben) 1921, Rosemary 1923, Peter 1930.

During the drought of 1930 to 1937 the mother, Philomenia, died. She died September 6, 1934 and was buried in St. Joseph Cemetery in Dickinson, North Dakota. Anton Kubischta farmed until 1943. In February, 1972, he wrote this short family history and prepared the accompanying map of Kirey-Tabor, one of the many small German villages in the Crimea. Anton died in 1975.

MEMOIRS OF THE KUBISCHTA FAMILY

This is the story of the 6 generation's of Frank J. Kubischta, (great Grampa). Grampa, Frank Kubischta was born in Vienna, Austria, in 1815. He grew to manhood in Vienna and learned the trade of shoe repair. Frank's wife was a woman from Zaltzburg, Austria. Their family consisted of 1 girl and 5 boys.

At this time in history, the Russians had won a war with Turkey and took into their possession the peninsula of Crimea, in the Black Sea. They killed or chased all the Turks out of the area and needed new settlers for the area. Because Russia had helped Austria fight a war with Germany, Austria had promised to send 1 male settler for every Russian soldier that was killed in the war.

There was not much there when they arrived, each male received 80 acres (32 desantine in Russian) to farm and ranch on and build their houses on. They built their houses in one village. They constructed them out of sand rock which could be cut with a certain saw. These replaced the dirt buts that the Turks had lived in.

In addition to his farming and sheep ranching, he also had a shee repair shop. Frank Kubischta, (grampa) died at Dickinson, North Dakota, July 6, 1906.

In 1886, Frank's son, John F. Kubischta married Marie Semerad, daughter of Dorothea (Sharepa) Semerad. Out of this marriage were born, Anton 1888, Anna 1891, Marie 1894, Joseph 1896, Alois and Philomenia (twins) 1900, Katerina 1903, Frances 1905, Frank 1907, (died in 1920) James 1911.

In September 1899, the family of John F. Kubischta, moved to the United Stated of America. On October 4,1899, they reached Dickinson, North Dakota and spent the winter with his brother-in-law, Joseph Semerad. In the spring of 1900, John moved to a homestead south of Dickinson, where he farmed until he retired in 1916. John F. Kubischta, died in November 1929, also mother, Marie (Semerad) Kubischta died July 1937.

On November 19,1909, John's son Anton Kubischta married Philomenia Dolechek, then moved to a homestead south of South Heart, North Dakota. To this family was born 7 boys and 2 girls. The order they were born is as follows: Valentine 1910, Vincent 1911, Anton 1913, Florian 1915, John 1916, Emilia 1919, Vendeline (Ben) 1921, Rosemary 1923, Peter 1930.

During the drought of 1930 to 1937 the mother, Philomenia died. She died September 6,1934 and was buried in St Joseph Cemetry, in Dickinson, North Dakota. In 1937 Anton Kubischta's family moved to Hope, North Dakota. Except Valentine who stayed in Belfield, North Dakota. Anton Kubischta farmed until 1943 and is still alive writing this today. February 1972.
